PUBLIC COMMENTS

Emily Donahue, resident from the City of Watseka, addressed the Board regarding a recent experience she had with Animal Control. Her 2 dogs got out of a compromised area of their fence. One of the dogs was found by a citizen and subsequently picked up by the Animal Control Warden who was unable to release the dog under the direction of the Animal Control Director. Her dog was held for 14 hours in the care of Animal Control and she is suspicious if her dog was walked in that time or if it received any food or water in the time it was held. Emily went on to say she was charged for two days of boarding which she felt was excessive. She feels the Animal Control System in Iroquois County is flawed and she would like to go through the proper channels to help bring change to system.

CHAIRMAN COMMENTS

Chairman Shure read a letter of resignation from Finance Director Anita Speckman whose last day of employment will be April 27, 2018. At this time Chairman Shure appointed a Search Committee to handle the hiring of a new Finance Director. The members of the Search Committee are as follows: Michael McTaggart, Chairman; Kyle Anderson, Vice-Chairman; Russell Bills, Charlie Alt, Donna Crow, Troy Krumwiede, and Daniel Rayman.

OUTSIDE ORGANIZATION REPORTS

(The reports from the I-KAN Education Committee and 708 Mental Health Board have been recorded and placed on file in the County Clerk's Office.)

IEDA Director Ken Barragree talked about the aftermath of the most recent flood. He said the bulk of the damage was to Watseka and there were 20 businesses affected from the flood. This number is not including those businesses that were isolated with no traffic able to access their sites. He commented that it hurts or affects the business anytime normal expected

sales are lost. Ken also reported the Bosch building is still up for sale. There has been interest shown, however with that interest, the bank holding the note has increased the price. He feels it may ultimately have to be razed. Ken provided information for a loan from the Revolving Loan Fund to a business located outside the City of Watseka. In closing he said Union Pacific has approved upgrades of track & bridges in the State of Illinois.

Chad McGinnis reported the I-KAN Education Committee held their quarterly meeting on March 15, 2018. The life cycles building inspections will begin soon and he mentioned they are short on substitute teachers and bus drivers within the region.

Mr. McGinnis also presented a report from the 708 Mental Health Board, which is responsible for oversight of the property tax that is collected to support mental health. In Iroquois County, \$585,000 is collected in property tax and given to the Iroquois Mental Health Center. He went over a list of services provided by the Mental Health Center for citizens throughout Iroquois County.

POLICY & PROCEDURE

Chairman Shure gave the report of the Policy & Procedure Committee. At this time, Sheriff Derek Hagen talked to the Board about information that he presented to the Finance Committee, which was a comparison of salaries between department heads and chief deputies or senior paid employees. This comparison shows the Sheriff salary currently \$7,800 less than the most senior lieutenant due to the Sheriff salary being frozen from 2009-2014. Based on the proposed raise for the Sheriff, the difference will rise to \$10,000 by the end of the 2022 term. It was moved by Mr. Anderson and seconded to remove from the report and send back to committee, the paragraph that refers to the salaries for elected officials. Your Committee to whom was referred **Policy & Procedure** would beg leave to submit the following report on the matters before them:

Your Committee met at the Administrative Center on March 29, 2018 at 9:00 A.M. Members present were County Board Chairman John Shure, Lyle Behrends, Russell Bills, and Marvin Stichnoth. Dan Rayman, Kyle Anderson, and Troy Krumwiede were absent. Also present Finance Director Anita Speckman, County Clerk Lisa Fancher, Treasurer Mindy Kuntz Hagan, Supervisor of Assessments Bob Yergler, County Engineer Joel Moore, ICPHD Administrator Dee Schippert, EMA Director Eric Ceci, 911 Director Eric Raymond, and County Board member Charlie Alt.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Marvin Stichnoth and seconded by Russell Bills to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

The Committee Chairs gave their monthly reports.

- Highway Chairman Russell Bills reported the Highway Committee will open bids for road work that was discussed last month.
- Management Chairman Lyle Behrends reported the Judicial Committee will receive their monthly reports. The Management Committee will discuss office space and the Jail parking lot.
- Tax Chairman Marvin Stichnoth reported the committee will receive Department Head reports.

EMA Director Eric Ceci reported he is continuing to work on flooding issues. The preliminary damage assessment with IEMA and FEMA teams is complete. There were 355 homes affected, 217 homes with minor damage, 97 with major damage, and 1 destroyed throughout Iroquois County. In terms of public assistance, Ceci has estimated over \$600,000 in damage costs for the County. Ceci will submit his estimates to the State. We have surpassed the minimum needed for Iroquois but the State needs to reach \$18.7 million dollars. Ceci does not anticipate Iroquois County reaching that amount. Ceci informed the Committee that muck out operations are still ongoing. Ceci is gathering additional volunteers to be trained. Ceci is working with the National Weather Service to host a severe weather tabletop exercise. No date has been set yet. Ceci has also begun updating the Hazardous Material Mitigation Plan.

County Board Chairman John Shure spoke about the matter of the Finance Committee minutes not being approved at the March 13th Board meeting. Shure discussed the matter with State's Attorney Jim Devine and was advised that because nothing was transacted at the meeting, it is considered a "non-event" because the minutes were not approved. Further research Shure has done advises minutes to always be approved. Corrections should have been made where necessary and then approve the minutes. Discussion was held on why the minutes were not approved and whether the reports given at the meeting should be given again. Shure stated when voting on minutes, you are voting to approve what occurred during the meeting. You are not voting on whether or not you like what was said during the meeting. The matter will be discussed further with Devine.

The job description for 911 Director Eric Raymond was distributed. Finance Director Anita Speckman also provided job descriptions for other County employees as a comparison. Raymond informed the committee the original job description that was distributed has not been approved by the ETSB Board yet. It was sent to the Policy & Procedure committee for necessary changes and approval. Shure suggested the committee review the job description given to them today and approve it at next month's meeting. Also, Speckman recommended Raymond speak with her regarding the job description's physical requirements.

It was moved by Behrends and seconded by Bills to enter into executive session at 9:35 A.M. pursuant to 5ILCS120/2 (c) (1) the appointment, employment, compensation, discipline, performance, or dismissal of specific employees of the public body or legal counsel for the public body, including hearing testimony on a complaint lodged against an employee of the public body or against legal counsel for the public body to determine its validity. However, a meeting to consider an increase in compensation to a specific employee of the public body that is subject to the Local Government Wage Increase Transparency Act may not be closed and shall be open to the public and posted and held in accordance with this Act. Motion carried by a roll call vote.

It was moved by Bills and seconded by Behrends to come out of executive session at 10:00 A.M. Motion carried by a voice vote.

(The following paragraph was removed and sent back to committee for further consideration pre action taken by the full County Board on April 10, 2018.)

It was moved by Behrends and seconded by Stichnoth to set the salaries for the County Clerk, Treasurer, Sheriff and Circuit Clerk at a 2% increase each year for fiscal years 2019, 2020, 2021 and 2022. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

Shure spoke about the Illinois Municipal Auditing Law that was discussed at a prior meeting. He stated the law applies to Townships and Municipalities but does not require any action by the County. The committee agreed not to take any action.

Shure reported upcoming appointments include Charlie Alt being reappointed to the 911 Board and Bob Yergler being reappointed to the Supervisor of Assessments position.

Correspondence was distributed to the committee, including a letter from Microgrid Energy regarding solar development on the County Farm. The letter will be discussed at the Management Committee.

The committee reviewed the claims. Ceci submitted flood related claims to the committee. These claims include Hiltz Portable Sanitation, Watseka Animal Hospital, personnel time and travel for Watseka Animal Hospital staff and Fastenal totaling \$5,986.71. Discussion was held on payment of the claim to Fastenal and whether the City of Watseka should be responsible for a portion of the bill. Shure plans to have conversations with the City of Watseka

as he doesn't believe the entire burden should fall on the County. It was also noted these flood related claims are not included in the budget. It was moved by Bills and seconded by Behrends to pay the claims, including Fastenal in the amount of \$3,505.05 and to pursue cooperative efforts for repayment subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Stichnoth and seconded by Bills to adjourn at 10:28 A.M. Motion carried by a voice vote.

Your committee met at the Administrative Center on April 5, 2018 at 9:00 A.M. Members present were Kyle Anderson, Michael McTaggart, Charlie Alt, Russell Bills, Ernie Curtis and Sherry Johnson. Dan Rayman was absent. Also present Finance Director Anita Speckman, Sheriff Derek Hagen, County Clerk Lisa Fancher, Treasurer Mindy Kuntz Hagan, Circuit Clerk Lisa Hines, Supervisor of Assessments Bob Yergler, EMA Director Eric Ceci,

ICPHD Administrator Dee Schippert, Greg Steffen with Compass Insurance, Suzie Werner with HomeStar Insurance, Roger Bard, and Wendy Davis with the Times Republic.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Russell Bills and seconded by Michael McTaggart to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

Greg Steffen with Compass Insurance reported on behalf of Randy Schuldt. The squad car that struck a deer is back in service. Steffen said they are coordinating with loss control and asked what other departments they should be meeting with besides the Sheriff's department. The committee recommended the Highway department.

Suzie Werner with HomeStar Insurance reported no updates.

The Department Heads gave their monthly reports. They are as follows:

- County Clerk Lisa Fancher reported the final multiplier was received on Wednesday.
- EMA Director Eric Ceci reported the total flood related damage cost is \$674,600.62.
- Sheriff Derek Hagen reported a retirement in February. A lateral transfer was hired and is now on solo patrol. Hagen is in the process of testing to establish a required hiring list. Hagen distributed a salary comparison to the committee. Hagen explained the Sheriff's salary has fallen behind due to the salary freeze that occurred in 2010 through 2014. By the end of 2021, based on the recommended salary increase from the Policy & Procedure committee and the FOP increases, the lieutenant's will be earning \$10,000 more than the Sheriff's position. Hagen recommended the Board increase the salary to just above what a lieutenant is earning and continue each year with annual increases.
- Circuit Clerk Lisa Hines discussed the decrease in fees and fines. She explained there aren't as many traffic tickets being written and people are not paying their fines. They are being turned over to collections, which sometimes results in small monthly payments. Hines is also working with the Comptroller's office and anyone owing fines will have their tax return intercepted.
- Finance Director Anita Speckman reported she received a letter from the IRS stating the \$184,000 fine that was assessed to us on our 2015 1095's has been eliminated.

The committee discussed funding for arbitration. Speckman provided the committee with the Public Safety Tax balance of \$211,549.38. Based upon the FY18 deposits at approximately \$35,000 each month, Speckman said the Public Safety Tax fund balance is estimated to be \$491,000 by November 30th. In total, \$345,000 is needed to cover the backpay and increases through 2018. Speckman said there is also \$50,000 budgeted in the Contingent fund. Speckman expects the completed contract within a month.

Michael McTaggart asked Charlie Alt and the 911 Board to speak with 911 Director Eric Raymond about grants for equipment.

The financial policies will be reviewed as a group beginning next month.

The committee reviewed claims. It was moved by McTaggart and seconded by Alt to pay the claims subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Alt and seconded by McTaggart to adjourn at 9:35 A.M. Motion carried by a voice vote

Your Committee met at the Administrative Center on April 2, 2018 at 9:00 A.M. Members present Lyle Behrends, Charlie Alt, Larry Hasbargen, Sherry Johnson, Chad McGinnis, and Barbara Offill. Kevin Bohlmann was absent. Also present Finance Director Anita Speckman, ICPHD Administrator Dee Schippert, Maintenance Supervisor Chris Drake, Jason Meyers with Johnson Controls, Superintendent of Veterans Assistance Jennifer Ingram, and Wendy Davis with the Times Republic.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Charlie Alt and seconded by Barbara Offill to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

Jason Meyers with Johnson Controls distributed a preliminary analysis that was created during their building walk through. Each building can utilize savings by upgrading lighting. The Courthouse has HVAC equipment that needs upgraded and the chiller at the Jail needs replaced. Also, heat pumps need replaced at the Administrative Center. Meyers said the estimated savings in over 20 years is between \$730,000 and \$1,600,000. All costs will be paid up front by the County and recouped through the savings. Meyers explained the items listed on the analysis are not in priority order and not all have to be selected. Johnson Controls does their best to work with local contractors.

Management Chairman Lyle Behrends informed the committee SmartWatt will have their presentation next month. Also, Preeminent Development sent their updated terms to State's Attorney Jim Devine. Chad McGinnis noted Johnson Controls is the only company thus far that has offered a performance and savings guarantee.

Maintenance Supervisor Chris Drake reported on the following:

- Drake began installing LED bulbs in the Administrative Center. The bulbs in the breakroom, men's restroom and all hallways have been converted to LED. Drake anticipates an annual savings of \$600 due to the conversion.
- Fire extinguishers have been inspected.
- Cell phone use is now prohibited at the Courthouse. Signs were ordered for the doors.
- The mole issue at the Administrative Center has been addressed.

Behrends addressed Drake's maintenance budget and whether he would be able to purchase additional LED bulbs for the building. Drake said with four months into the year he is at 22% of his budget. It was moved by McGinnis and seconded by Offill to authorize Drake to purchase additional LED bulbs for the Administrative Center. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

Behrends discussed the Courthouse parking lot. Specifications have not been received from County Engineer Joel Moore yet but the committee can send the project out for bids. It was moved by Offill and seconded by McGinnis to receive bids on the south side of the Courthouse parking lot. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

A letter was received from Microgrid Energy regarding potential solar development on the County Farm. Behrends reminded the committee there is a lease on the farm for two more years. The committee agreed Microgrid Energy should be contacted and make a presentation. Sherry Johnson noted their letter states there is an option to continue using the land outside the lease boundary.

McGinnis gave an update on the office space in the Administrative Center. He was given an estimate of \$2,000-\$2,500 to build the additional office in the Animal Control office. However, no money is budgeted for the building of an additional office. Larry Hasbargen stated Superintendent of Veterans Assistance Jennifer Ingram has clients that will complete the work at no charge. McGinnis said another option is to move Ingram into the Animal Control office, leave space available for a meeting area for negotiations and move the County Board Chairman to Ingram's office. IEDA Director Ken Barragree and the IKAN office will remain where they are. For this to take place, Ingram will need to cover the cost of building the wall in the Animal Control office, removing the counter and any electrical or flooring needs. Ingram said she will speak with her board members but she doesn't see this being an issue. Behrends asked for Ingram to get approval by her board and their building plans to the Management Committee by

next month. Ingram said she has clients that are licensed contractors that are willing to do the work.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Hasbargen and seconded by Alt to pay the claims, subject to County Board approval. Motion carried by a roll call vote.

During old business, Behrends informed the committee the cost for salt this season was \$21,384. The committee discussed options for future bidding which include salting of the sidewalks only and requesting the salt pricing be included in the bids. Behrends requested the committee members gather any changes to the snow removal bid form and submit them to Drake.

It was moved by Alt seconded by Offill to adjourn the meeting at 10:30 A.M. Motion carried by a voice vote.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Barbara Offill and seconded by Jed Whitlow to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

The committee reviewed the claims. County Clerk Lisa Fancher explained the difference in election judge payments depends on whether or not they attended election judge school. Election judges are also paid mileage. It was moved by Whitlow and seconded by Kevin Coughenour to pay the claims subject to County Board approval. Motion carried by a roll call vote.

There were no public comments.

The department heads gave their monthly reports.

- Treasurer Mindy Kuntz Hagan reported her office is currently collecting mobile home taxes.
- County Clerk Lisa Fancher reported the election officially ends today once the mail is received. The final official results should be available online this afternoon. Fancher said there were not enough ballots received via mail to change the results. In the Tax Extension department, all work is complete until the final multiplier is received. Devnet has been onsite training the new tax extension clerk and assured Fancher they are on track and will be finished by late April or early May. Lastly, there are several new laws that are going to require changes in the Recording department. One item is to set a predictable fee schedule but the deadline is not until 2019. Also, they will eventually need to convert to myDec, which is a real estate transfer tax system. Fancher said the office currently uses paper stamps and the new system will be digital.
- Supervisor of Assessments Bob Yergler reported he received an email from the Department of Revenue's equalization department. Yergler responded to their questions and said there is usually a two week turnaround to receive the final multiplier. Yergler said his organization is working with legislature and the energy industry to develop assessment procedures for solar development. Effective January 1st, the Assessment office converted to the myDec system. Yergler stated they are also waiting on the final multiplier. A public notice will be published for those who were involved in the flood. The Governor's Declaration allows them to apply for assessment relief. Forms are available in his office to begin the process. He is currently monitoring the properties that have been deemed damaged. As of now there are 10 that either need elevated, destroyed or moved. Further discussion was held regarding flood related matters. Yergler informed the committee that the County is part of the Federal Flood Insurance Program and must adhere to the guidelines of the program.

Animal Control Director Dr. Youssef gave his report for March which included 7 dogs picked up and brought to the clinic. One bat case was report to the committee. Dr. Youssef reported his clinic received a visit from the Humane Society of Champaign to evaluate the animal control dog's behavior.

Tax Chairman Marvin Stichnoth informed the committee that Finance Director Anita Speckman has developed a portal where dog owners can pay their registration fees online. The

website, www.iroqac.com, was effective March 23rd and also includes lost dog information and a frequently asked questions section.

During old business, Stichnoth is continuing to get in contact with the Illinois Animal Control Association about registration.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Krumwiede and seconded by Offill to adjourn the meeting at 9:44 A.M. Motion carried by a voice vote.

Schippert noted she posted information from the Illinois Department of Public Health regarding synthetic cannabinoids on the Health Department's Facebook page. As of April 2nd, there have been 56 reported cases, including 2 deaths, linked to an outbreak since March 7th.

ICPHD Nurse Jane Newell spoke to the committee about the breast and cervical cancer program offered at the Health Department. Newell explained the program provides free cancer screenings and breast and cervical screenings to women between the ages of 35 to 64. They must be underinsured and live in Iroquois County.

OLD BUSINESS

Mrs. Johnson asked for an update on cages that were purchased by Animal Control to use for animals that were housed in the shelter during the flood. Chairman Shure he did not know where the cages were at the present time; however, he would contact the Animal Control Administrator for an answer.

EMA Director Eric Ceci gave an update on the most recent flood. The estimate for damage costs is approximately \$600,000 for the County and will continue to accumulate as recovery continues. He confirmed that this number came from various entities throughout the County. He doesn't anticipate any federal monies for recovery and will know by Friday if the State has requested assistance from the federal government. The Illinois DNR is offering volunteer buyouts to recurrent flood damaged homes which is good news for homeowners but bad news for the tax base because these properties would then remain green space. The Long Term Recovery Committee, which is funded through donations and solicitations from trust and grants, has been working to address needs of flood victims. In closing, Eric confirmed that he will be working to update the Hazard Mitigation Plan which is currently expired.
